Does Uzbekistan have an energy surplus?Uzbekistan has historically been an energy surplus nation, ranking fifth in Eurasia in . Nevertheless, increasing domestic energy demand has significantly reduced net energy exports. Indeed, net energy exports amounted to just 1% of total energy production in . How will Uzbekistan improve electricity production?The government plans to invest \$4 billion in the National Electric Grid of Uzbekistan over the next five years to facilitate these projects. Reducing electricity production costs is another major priority, with a particular emphasis on alternative energy sources. How much electricity does Uzbekistan need?According to projections, Uzbekistan will require 117 billion kilowatt-hours of electricity by , increasing to 135 billion kilowatt-hours by --1.7 times the current consumption. To meet these demands, the Ministry of Energy has developed a long-term strategy focused on infrastructure development and efficiency improvements. How much energy does Uzbekistan export?Energy exports accounted for roughly 6.2%, 0.91 Billion USD\$, of Uzbekistan's export revenue, generating 1.3% of GDP in . Energy imports, on the other hand, accounted for 5.1% of total imports, 1.27 Billion USD\$. What is Uzbek energy mix?Natural gas dominates the Uzbek Energy mix with a share of 85.9%, whilst renewable energy, solely hydropower, accounts for only 0.9% of the share. Electricity generation is also dominated by natural gas with 88% of the share, whilst hydropower holds a share of 7%. Is Uzbekistan a renewable country?The country is rich in natural resources, including oil, gas, and coal, and has a growing renewable energy sector. Uzbekistan has set ambitious goals for renewable energy production, aiming to generate 25 percent of its electricity from renewable sources by . Uzbekistan's solar and wind power plants have generated 4 billion kilowatt-hours (kWh) of electricity since the beginning of this year, according to a report released by the Ministry of Energy on October 20.
